Classroom Catch Up: What a fabulous week in Class R/1! I cannot believe it is our last week next week and the first part of the summer term is over! In English, we have been looking at the suffix 'ing' and we have been coming up with lots of verbs that end in ing! The children have really enjoyed our activities this week. In maths, Reception have been taking away and Year 1 have started a new topic of multiplication of 2s, 5s and 10s. In Forest School, we used the Wednesday Word which focussed on friendship; we spoke about the importance of friendship and what makes a good friend. We finished our topic in R.E. which was about sharing good news and ended it by creating a dance to the song "Best day of our lives".'

We've had a fantastic week in Class 2/3! In history this week, the children have enjoyed learning about the life of Rosa Parks and what makes her a significant individual. In R.E., the children created a collage to sum up the meaning of Pentecost. On Friday, Class 2/3 enjoyed leading the school Mass based on The Ascension. To end the week, the children moved on to explore letters in English and are planning to write a letter in the role of somebody who travelled on the Empire Windrush.



I cannot believe we are heading into the final week of this half term – I really do not know where the weeks have gone! The children in Class 4/5 have been working incredibly hard this week writing their Viking sagas to share with the children in Class R/1 – it has been so lovely seeing their enthusiasm for writing. In science, the children have been experimenting with the increase and decrease of volume and the ability to change the pitch of a sound- hopefully they will be able to tell you all about it! Year 4 have blown me away with their maths ability this week as they have been starting to explore decimal numbers for the first time whilst Year 5 have continued to work hard with rounding. All in all, another fabulous week at St Joseph's.

In science this week, Year 6 have been investigating how light travels in straight lines, and how a shadow is always the same shape as the object that cast it. We are nearly at the end of our modelled write in English and we are looking forward to writing our own versions of "Goodnight Mister Tom" next week. In computing, Miss Sanders brought in a gadget which can be programmed into its own step counter—Year 6 had great fun counting their steps so they could listen their own celebratory message.

Stanley Grange: This week, pupils looked around all the allotments on site and learnt about the two different ways of planting strawberries using either seeds or runners. They enjoyed a tour of the grounds and visited the sensory garden, saw the fruit trees, the fairy garden and newly installed outdoor gym. The group also made plant-based manure from comfrey which they covered with water in a bucket; in a few weeks' it will be ready to go on our school allotment.


Why not join Children's Liturgy Group on Sunday 9:30am Mass - we would love to see you.


