Classroom Catch Up: What a fantastic week in Class R/1! We have been doing our assessments all week and I am so proud of all the children; it is amazing to see how far they have come! In RE we have been continuing our theme on Friendship which the children are loving; in our Journey in Love, we have been looking at what we want in a friend and what makes us unique. In geography, the children had the pleasure of Miss Bottomley teaching them all about how the differences between the sea and the ocean. In science we have been looking at different minibeasts and comparing them to each other.

This week in Class 2/3, we have explored the physical and human features of our local area using a range of maps. In computing, the children enjoyed developing their digital art skills. They used paint tools to click and drag to recreate the work of the artist Kandinsky. In English, the children have enjoyed writing a story about 'An Eventful Day at the Beach'. Maths wise, we are continuing our topic of time, focusing on am and pm, as well as years, months and days.

It has been assessment week in Class 4/5 and my goodness the children have been working hard! It is always lovely at this time of year to see how much progress the children have made and I couldn't be prouder of each and every one of them. We have also started our new science topic this week 'Human Development'. The children have started the unit by sequencing the life cycle of a human. We will then be looking at each stage of the cycle in more depth over the coming weeks. We also started a new unit in RE this week based on reconciliation and the children created their own friendship recipes which was really enjoyable. We will be starting to look at the Sacramental Act of Reconciliation next week.

Excitement is running high this week in Class 6! We have got our Year 6 residential starting on Monday; we have nearly finished all 8 scenes of our production; and still we have managed to create an independent explanation text in English! In science, we have been looking at inheritance, adaptation and evolution, looking at different traits that an offspring inherits from its mother and father, and how thousands and thousands of years ago, a giraffe looked very similar to a horse!

# What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

# AI VIRTUAL FRIENDS

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? Artificial intelligence – particularly in terms of how it generates natural language – has seen significant development over the last six months, with companies releasing new Al-based software or adding an Al element to existing apps (such as Snapchat, for example). One form of Al to become especially popular has been the fAl friend' or chatbot, as children eagerly experiment with these new-found computer-generated companions. There are nownumerous apps available with this virtual friend' functionality, with the likelihood of it being added to other successful platforms soon.

# CONTENT AND ACCOUNTABILITY

Al chatbots may not always be able to recognise when content is age inappropriate or harmful and should be filtered out. So there's a possibility that children could be exposed to offensive language or explicit material while conversing with their virtual friend. The companies producing such Al solutions are also unlikely to take responsibility for any content that the classificance.

# REDUCED SOCIAL CONTACT

An excessive reliance on chatbots for social interaction could potentially cause a child to begin reducing the amount of face-to-face communication they have, leading to social isolation. If young people become dependent on chatbots to provide companionship, it could very likely hinder the development of their real-life social skills.

#### LACK OF SENSITIVITY

Chatbot software Isn't always sophisticated enough to pick up on subtle emotional cues or recognise signs of distress in children, as most humans would. It might therefore fail to respond appropriately. Al misinterpreting what it's being told or replying insensitively to a young user who's already struggling could potentially impact a child's emotional wellbeing or exacerbate any existing emotional issues.

# UNINTENTIONAL BIAS

Al companions are only as reliable as the information they've been programmed with. The algorithms they use, therefore, may unintentionally promote blas, stereotypes or discriminatory behaviour (as many originate from the USA or the UK, for instance, they can display a distinctly western-centric worldview). This could lead to children developing skewed attitudes and behaviours.

# COGNITIVE LIMITATIONS

Although many are now undenlably advanced, Al-powered chatbots still have limitations in terms of understanding complex concepts, context and nuance. Depending heavily on chatbots to help with learning or solving problems may stunt the development of a child's own powers of critical thinking, creativity and ability to engage in open-ended discussions with other people.

## PRIVACY CONCERNS

Chatbots typically collect data about users, including personal information and conversations. This is ostensibly to improve their performance as they gradually learn about our behaviour – but many experts are warning that there may be significant risks associated with how this information is stored and used (the possibility of potential breaches or misuse by third parties, for instance).



# Advice for Parents & Carers

# CHAT ABOUT CHATBOTS

If your child is already expressing an interest in Al apps, a relaxed, natural chat should help you to discover which opes they're aware of and how they're using them (or are planning to). Discuss these options with your child and perhaps do your own research to ensure you think they re suitable. Once you're totally happy, you could sit with your young one and begin exploring Al chatbots together.

# CREATE A SAFE ENVIRONMENT

If your child is keen to engage with AI chatbots, encourage them to do so in a safe environment: ideally in a shared space at home, so you can easily keep an eye and ear on their progress. Set up appropriate content filtering measures in advance — and gently remind them that you'll be close by and ready to help with any questions or concerns that may arise.

#### FIND A BALANCE

Work alongside your child to establish the right balance in terms of how they might use Al-powered chatbots – and when it's appropriate. It's important to make sure that children are still getting plenty of opportunities to learn to solve problems for themselves, as well as building their interpersonal skills through face-to-face conversations with friends family members and teachers.

#### TAKE CONTROL

As with any form of app or game, when it comes to AI chatbots we'd strongly recommend that you consider employing parental controls (either on the device being used or within the software itself) to manage which apps your child can download and use. This is particularly important for younger children, who may be more at




# RECOGNISE THE RISKS

It's unlikely that most children will have even considered the potential risks attached to having a virtual companion. So it's probably wise to explain some of the possible hazards and challenges of AI chatbots to your child. In particular, emphasise that AI isn't a real person (however much it might sound like one) and may occasionally tell them something that isn't entirely impartial or accurate.






