Readings: Zechariah 9:9-10, Romans 8:9,11-13, Matthew 11:25-30.

In our first reading, St Paul exhorts the Romans, as Christians, to focus on the spiritual not the unspiritual *because the Spirit of God has made his home in you*. The Spirit of God is the same Spirit who raised Christ from the dead and that as sisters and brothers of Christ, they share the same Spirit who will give new life to their mortal bodies as well. He tells them, therefore, to put an end to the misdeeds of the body and they will live.

The other week, we spoke of heresies as teachings at variance with official or orthodox teachings such as that of the Church. One of these teachings which may have been in the mind of St Paul as he wrote this letter is the belief that the material world was created by a lesser being than God, that creation is all bad, including humanity, unless you were among the enlightened with a kind of divine spark within you which was destined to be liberated from the evil body at death and re-join the ultimate spirit. This meant that what you did with the physical body was irrelevant since your liberation from it was assured – which allowed for all kinds of abuses and sinful actions of the body

But St Paul says No! The Spirit of God has made his home in you. It is your whole body, (material and spiritual) that will either be saved or not and this is why in his Gospel, St John is keen to emphasis the bodily appearance of Jesus after his resurrection: feel my body, put your hand in my wounds, give me some fish to eat because this is me in my body and not some ghost or detached spirit.

True, it was a glorified body not subject to the physical limitation of **our** unglorified bodies but eternity in God's love (Heaven) or eternity outside of it (Hell), depends upon how we use our bodies in both the material and spiritual sense.

To follow the unspiritual is to sin, but can we by a mere act of will, turn from sin because; if it is all *will* then where is the *grace* and if it is all *grace*, then where is the *will* – since there must be room for the exercise of free will?

It is enough here to say that this has been a thorny question over the centuries, so let's look to the Word of God.

In his first letter, St John states the case but also helps us out. He says that if we say we have no sin in us, we deceive ourselves. But he goes on to say: *I am writing this letter to stop you sinning, but if anyone should sin, we have the advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ who is just and is the Sacrifice who takes our sins away. (2: 1-2)*

Earlier in his letter to the Romans, we find St Paul struggling with trying to understand his own attraction to sin when he speaks of the things he knows he shouldn't do which he does and the things he doesn't do that he

knows he should, and he cries out *What a wretched man I am! Who will rescue me from this body doomed to death* and he answers his own question: *Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ.*

In today's Gospel, Jesus gives his own answer: Come to me all who labour and are overburdened and I will give you rest. Shoulder my yoke and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart and you will find rest for your souls.

Surely his invitation is extended to all who are overburdened and weighed down by sin.

So then, do we have an answer to the question: *is it my will or God's grace that turns me from the unspiritual to the spiritual?*

Maybe it is the *will* responding to his grace... the way I may feel the irresistible warmth of the sun on my back and turning, bathe my whole being in it...the *turning* being my free choice to embrace it.

Or maybe we should just heed Jesus' words and have the humility to accept our intellectual limitations in these matters and simply turn to him with childlike trust and an open heart.

Wouldn't that be a start to living the spiritual life?

This week's Saints

St Benedict (c480-550)

Born in Norcia, Italy and educated in Rome. He lived a solitary life in a cave in Subiaco for three years. Later he organised a form of monastic life in twelve monasteries. The monks who joined him devoted themselves to work and prayer. In the abbey of Monte Cassino which he founded, he wrote his Rule. He was proclaimed Patron of Europe because of his influence in the formation of Christendom in the Middle Ages.

St Bonaventure (1218-74) Cardinal, Bishop and Franciscan.

He was of Italian birth, of great intellect and a friend of that other great intellect: St Thomas Aquinas of the Dominican Order.

But Bonaventure was less dogmatic than St Thomas and rather more mystical in his theological understanding – believing that the simpler, less educated mind could have a clearer understanding of God than the wise and clever.

To that end, a saying attributed to him: To know much and taste nothing - of what use is that?

RISING COSTS

For everyone, the cost of living is presently rising at an alarming rate. Energy costs are at an all-time high, and the cost of essentials at the supermarket increases each week. So now is not a good time to appeal for additional help for the church's finances, but sadly, however, it is necessary. The heating bills for the church are rising just as much as in your homes, and the maintenance of the old buildings are a constant drain on the church's income.

So, we are asking that if you can do so without making your personal situation much worse, could you consider adding a little extra in your weekly offering or monthly standing order? Just a 10% increase will help offset the much greater costs of electricity, gas and essential maintenance the church faces in the coming months.

Also, if you pay UK income tax, signing up for Gift Aid will cost you nothing, but allow the church to reclaim from the government an additional 20% of your offering.

Another extremely valuable benefit for the church, but one which is often not considered is that of leaving a legacy to the benefit of St Joseph's. If you are considering writing or making amendments to your will, this would be a perfect time to add a clause defining the amount you would like to give to the church. It is very important that any alterations to a will are officially sanctioned to avoid any issues at the time of probate. Thank you.
