

Classroom Catch Up:_In computing this week, Year 1 had lots of fun using frames in their animations. They were so excited to show their moving pictures with their peers after working very hard in their pairs. The children demonstrated great resilience! In PE, Class R/1 had fun showing off their fabulous dance moves! Our topic of dance makes PE a popular lesson of the week. Class 2/3 have completed their independent writes on the Great Fire of London and the use of adverb starters and a range of conjunctions was evident in every child's work. In RE, we have continued to look at our expectations for a new year, linking them to








Christ. Investigating what plants need to grow and be healthy has been the theme of our work in science. We have had a very productive week in Class 4/5! In science, we have been carrying on with our forces unit and have been exploring air resistance. This week, the children planned and conducted their own experiment based on creating the safest parachute (the one that takes the longest to land). The chil-

dren enjoyed working as a team to plan their experiment and also create their parachutes – we all had a lovely afternoon and learnt lots! In RE, we have been thinking about the role of the Bishop in our community and explored Archbishop Malcolm McMahon's motto and coat of arms. In PE, the children are enjoying a dance unit this half term where they are learning the 'Time Warp' and of course staff had to get involved as the song is infectious.

In maths, Class 6 have finished the unit on ration and proportion, linking them to recipes—if you need 100g of sugar for 8 cakes, how much do you need for 2? Our grammar focuses for English are the different varieties of past tense, alongside finding the subject and object in a sentence. Year 6 are looking forward to applying those to their independent writing which they will start next week. In history, the class has been discussing the events at Dunkirk in 1940 and finding out why the evacuation was so successful.

NSPCC.



Attendance and absence: As we

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

MyLOL is a free social networking and dating site aimed at teens. Profiles can publicly display users' images and information, including sexual orientation and personal interests. The service bills itself as "the number one teen dating website in the world", claiming to have more than a million users globally. Despite its popularity, the MyLOL app is no longer available from Google Play or the App Store, although the site is still active. In some countries, police forces and schools have previously warned parents about "sinister predators" and "inappropriate activities" on the site.

FLIMSY AGE GATES

Ithough MyLOL states it is xclusively aimed at users age etween 13 and 19, there is no redible age verification system reaction system to proven a younger child – or an older adult – from signing up to the olatform. Coupled with the fact that i's impossible to establish a user's rue identity on MyLOL, this raises a serious concern that the site could be used for grooming.

UNDER . AGE-INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

LOL maintains that it monitors uploaded images for nuclity or xual content. It also claims to be ble to detect suspicious keywords. wever, there have been numerous ports of explicit content being und on the platform, with users ten posting provocative, mi-nude pictures of themselves d engaging in flirty or sexually ni-nude pictures of themselv engaging in flirty or sexually licit conversation.

POTENTIAL CYBER-BULLYING De*#

MyLOL lets users 'vote' on other people based solely on their appearance, much in the same vein as the now-defunct site Hot or Not. s the now-defunct site Hot or Not. his feature could easily lead to listress and bullying, especially if a oung person's profile pics receive n unfavourable response. Various sviews of MyLOL have noted that ullying frequently becomes an isue in the platform's chat groups and adviste mesences d private messages.

MyLOL is free to join and use, but it also offers paid-for memberships. Users who have paid money get their profile promoted at the top of the site and in search results. They can also earn additional credits for increased engagement with the platform – such as sharing, reply to messages and voting. At the ti writing, the monthly memb e was \$9.95 (just under £8)

DATA COLLECTION

According to its privacy policy, MyLOL collects user data includ n tor contects user data including mail addresses, contact details and terests. While the company says it is committed to evaluate interests. While the company seys-is committed to protecting users' privacy, the small print states that information may be shared externally. MyLOL claims to follow procedures to keep data secure, but does not specify what these procedures are, or whether such on is encrypted

CONTACT FROM STRANGERS -

MyLOL makes it easy to connect with strangers. In fact, the site's rewards feature encourages users to send private messages to people they don't know. There have been several media stories of adults posing as teens on MyLOL to connect with minors, which could lead to extremely dangerous situations, such as a young person meeting up with someone who has been posting

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Advice for Parents & Carers

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DISCUSS ONLINE DATING

It's vital to talk to your child about the possible dangers of platforms like MyLOL – particularly the threat of online predators. Remind them of the risks of sharing intimate images and information with strangers and emphasise that most people don't realise they're being 'catfished' until it's too late – it really isn't wise for a young person to meet up with someone they've only spoken to online.

RESTRICT IN-APP SPENDING

If your child has access to a bank card or other payment method, they may be enticed into signing up for MyLOL's premium features. Having their profile boosted and receiving more attention could be especially tempting if their friends also use the site. You could consider altering their device's settings to disable internet purchases, or at the very least keeping an eye on their online spending.

EXPLAIN PRIVACY RISKS

NEW MESS A

-Before your child begins using a service such as MyLOL, it's important that they understand the potential pitfalls of giving out their personal data on this type of platform. Explain to them, for example, that they shouldn't divulge any personally identifying information to people who they don't know, as scammers can be quite convincing when attempting to steal someone's identity.

SET UP LOCATION ALERTS

If you're worried that your child may be planning to meet up with someone they've met on MyLOL, you could consider utilising GPS or WiFi location tracking technology to follow their whereabouts in real time. You can even set up a virtual boundary or 'fence' and opt to receive an alert to your phone if your child enters or exits a specified area.
