Readings: Acts 4:8-12, 1 John 3:1-2, John 10:11-18.

For of all the names in the world given to men, this is the only one by which we can be saved that name being Jesus. (1st reading)

These words do not square well with secular views such as: a person can do what they like so long as they do not hurt anyone or there is no need for God or religion binding us with rules and regulations.

They do not square with those who so easily say that the reason for so many religions is due to where you happen to have been born, so they are all of equal value and all point to the one God.

These words do not square well with those scientists who believe that there is no longer any need to speak of a creator God since our ever-advancing knowledge of the universe makes God redundant.

It's worth noting that this last example especially, may remind us of Eve in the garden of Eden, attracted by the tree God had forbidden her to eat from on pain of death. But she saw that the tree was good to eat, pleasing to the eye and that it was desirable for the **knowledge** that it could give. (Gen.3: 6)

In other words, they no longer need to depend upon God – an idea that the devil had put into her mind: for *you* will not die, your eyes will be opened and you will be like gods ... so let knowledge be your god and let it be made in your own image ... which is idolatry.

As a result of seeking their independence from God, the eyes of Adam and Eve were opened and they realized that they were naked, Cain kills Abel and the rest, as they say...

Whether or not we literally believe in this biblical account of Adam and Eve's fall from God's grace, the story conveys a truth that we can see all around us: that all is not well in the world, for there is war, persecution, pain illness, suffering and death ... all, a consequence of the *fall*.

The devil's hatred toward God and humanity is huge and it was that hatred which lured Adam and Eve into the committing of that primordial grave/mortal sin so infinite in malice against God's infinite love.

Such an act of infinite hatred, according to St Thomas Aquinas, could only be repaired by an act of infinite love which is beyond the power of any ordinary human being, all of whom are tainted by the fall of Adam and Eve.

And this is why no ordinary man or woman could do what we are now celebrating at Easter and at every Mass: the restoration of humanity's loving relationship with God ... through the death and resurrection of the one man *whose name, of all the names in the world, is the only one by which we can be saved* Jesus Christ – because he was no ordinary man, but the Son of God.

This week's Saints

St George (d 303) Patron of England, Venice, Genoa, Portugal, Catalonia, venerated in Russia and Ethiopia and one of the 14 Holy Helpers in Germany.

He is associated with the story of the fearsome dragon which had graduated from eating sheep to eating human sacrifices before being appeased. After the King's daughter became the sacrificial victim by lot, St George confronted the dragon and pierced it with his lance, tamed it and told the people that if they would believe in Christ and be baptized, he would rid them of the monster which they did and he did.

He is thought to have been martyred under the persecutions of Diocletian and Maximian.

St Mark the Evangelist thought to be the author of the gospel of the same name and was the travelling companion of both St Peter and St Paul.
