

Readings: Deuteronomy 8:2-3,14-16, 1 Corinthians 10:16-17, John 6:51-58.

The Ascension of the resurrected Lord beyond the earthly sight of the disciples enabled his presence to be more widely and more intimately felt through the workings of the Holy Spirit of Pentecost.

It is through the same Spirit that we are able to have faith and perhaps some insight into the mystery of the Holy Trinity as we reflected last week.

And today we have the last of these great post-Easter feasts with Corpus Christi: the celebration of his body and blood at the last supper which he left to the world in the form of bread and wine.

The communion sacrifices of bull's blood in which Moses separates one half representing God's side of the covenant and the other half being the people's side of the covenant, prefigures the new sacrificial covenant where the blood of God's Son is given up and *poured out* for us on the cross and in which we participate at every Mass.

For blood represents life, and in the giving of his blood, Christ gives his life totally and irrevocably; for once the blood is poured out, it cannot be poured back in again.

Two hundred years before Moses, Abraham receives bread and wine from the mysterious priest Melchizedek and later, in obedience to God's command, he goes up a mountain to offer the ultimate sacrifice of his son who innocently asks: 'where is the lamb for the offering' to which Abraham replies: 'God himself will provide the offering...'. Isaac the beloved son, the wood, the mountain and the intended sacrifice foreshadow Christ, the beloved Son and victim, the wood and altar of the cross and the sacrifice on the hill of Golgotha/Calvary.

These are among *the olden types foreshadowed*...taken from the last three verses of the *Sequence* attributed to Thomas Aquinas (13th cent) which we have just proclaimed together.

The offering of the bread and wine of Melchizedek, the compliance of Isaac to his father's will, the bull's blood of Moses – all find their culmination and realization in the Son, himself compliant to his Father's will, to offer himself in place of us as the *Preface* tells us: *for at the last supper with his Apostles, establishing for the ages to come the saving memorial of the cross, Christ offered himself to the Father as the unblemished lamb, the acceptable gift of perfect praise.*

All that went before were types and shadows in preparation for the real thing as Christ, speaking of himself, tells the Jews in today's Gospel:

This is the bread come down from heaven; not like the bread our ancestors ate: they are dead, but anyone who eats this bread will live for ever.

Yet even this great gift is but a foreshadowing of things to come as our post-communion prayer puts it:

Grant, O Lord, we pray, that we may delight for all eternity in that share in your divine life which is foreshadowed in the present age by our reception of your precious Body and Blood.

Let us make that our prayer and reflection for this week.

Commemorations this week

St Anthony of Padua (1195-1231) Began as an Augustinian but later became a Franciscan and after ordination was commended for his learning, eloquent preaching and winning countenance.

At some point, a novice tired of the Franciscan life made off with Anthony's Psalter book which contained his teaching notes and comments and which was valuable to him. Anthony prayed for its return and the novice stopped in his tracks, returned the book and resumed his noviciate hence the tradition of praying to him for lost items. (Another tradition says that a novice simple took the Psalter without permission.)

St Anthony's bread recalls his compassion for the poor and he died at the early age of 36 and is a Doctor of the Church.

The Most Sacred Heart of Jesus and **The Immaculate Heart of Mary** might be summarised in the following prayer:

O Sacred Heart of Jesus for whom it is impossible not to have compassion on the afflicted, have pity on us miserable sinners and grant us the grace which we ask of you, through the sorrowful and immaculate heart of Mary, your tender mother and ours.

RISING COSTS

For everyone, the cost of living is presently rising at an alarming rate. Energy costs are at an all-time high, and the cost of essentials at the supermarket increases each week. So now is not a good time to appeal for additional help for the church's finances, but sadly, however, it is necessary. The heating bills for the church are rising just as much as in your homes, and the maintenance of the old buildings are a constant drain on the church's income.

So we are asking that if you can do so without making your personal situation much worse, could you consider adding a little extra in your weekly offering or monthly standing order? Just a 10% increase will help offset the much greater costs of electricity, gas and essential maintenance the church faces in the coming months.

Also, if you pay UK income tax, signing up for Gift Aid will cost you nothing, but allow the church to reclaim from the government an additional 20% of your offering.

Another extremely valuable benefit for the church, but one which is often not considered, is that of leaving a legacy to the benefit of St Joseph's. If you are considering writing or making amendments to your will, this would be a perfect time to add a clause defining the amount you would like to give to the church. It is very important that any alterations to a will are officially sanctioned to avoid any issues at the time of probate. Thank you.
