

Last weekend: attendance: 110. Thank you for last week's collection of £365.90 and for May's standing orders of £1,329 (weekly average £300.09)

Readings: Exodus 19:2-6. Romans 5: 6-11. Matthew 9: 36-10: 8.

The other day, I had a telephone call from someone I took to be a Muslim from his intense line and manner of questioning me about the Christian faith.

It was one of those occasions when after the conversation, I thought of all the things I wished I had said.

But St Peter exhorts us to be able to account for our Christian hope and behind the *rant* were serious questions which deserve respect.

Among them was one that reveals a very different understanding of their belief from Christianity – even though in the 4th century, Christianity itself as good as embraced it for a short while.

I speak of the Arian heresy whose proponent went by the name Arius.

A heresy is generally defined as a doubt or denial of a defined teaching usually associated with Christianity.

The Arian heresy is described as the principle heresy that denied the true divinity of Jesus Christ who, they say, was created from nothing by the Father as an instrument for the creation of the world. He is called the Son of God not because he shares in the eternal divine nature of God but because of his righteousness.

No need here to go into the many and various forms of the heresy; it is enough to know that it denied the true divinity of Christ which is a denial of the Nicene Creed (AD 325) which affirms the true divinity of Christ along with the Father and the Holy Spirit.

It is this denial that lay behind my Muslim friend's enquiry: *How could a perfect, eternal, good God become a grubby human being and why should he want to*?

That is the heart of the question and the heart of the answer lies, as we would expect, in today's readings especially our second reading:

...but what proves that God loves us is that Christ died for us while we were still sinners.

We see, then, a God who does not reject his mucky creation, but who immersed himself right into it by becoming man. And in today's Gospel, we see a God who through that same man, Jesus, feels sorry for the

crowds because they were harried and dejected like sheep without a shepherd.

Moreover, we see a God who invites us to share in his own creative labours and produce with him, a harvest...

...and through his Son invites his followers, you and I, to share in his healing ministry, all of which is a foretaste of the kingdom of heaven.

We believe then, in a God who, yes! through his Son created all things; but the Son **we** believe in is *God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made and of one being, essence or nature, (consubstantial) with the Father.*

Heresies are not necessarily devised by evil people; just people attempting to make sense of what in the end can only remain a mystery. But heresies also **resemble** the truth and this is where the devil, the prince of half-truths and downright lies, steps in.

The creed which we will shortly profess together is not some invention – if even to counter a heresy. It is what was and continues to be handed down and defended from the earliest of times – well before the 4th c. AD.

Our belief in the true divinity of Jesus along with the Father and the Holy Spirit is a great gift from God. The *Incarnation* (his becoming flesh and blood as a human being) is his affirmation of love for this very imperfect world; but which he loved into being, holds in being and continues to shower it with his blessings because it was indeed, *very good* and continues to be through his Son Jesus Christ in the love of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

This week's commemorations

St Aloysius Gonzaga (1568-91) of Spain. Born into an influential family, desirous of joining the military, marching around with a pike as a boy even firing off a cannon without permission. Yet he felt called to the religious life, though a problem with his kidneys made military life less likely.

He joined the Jesuits and as a novice worked among those suffering from the plague until he himself caught it, eventually dying at such a young age but with the name of Jesus on his lips.

Ss John Fisher (1469-1535) and **Thomas More** (1477-1535) John Fisher was Bishop of Rochester and Thomas More, Lord Chancellor and friend of King Henry VIII. Both refused to acknowledge the king as Supreme Head of the Church as opposed to the Pope. Both were charged with treason and beheaded.

The Birth of St John the Baptist whom Jesus called the greatest of all the children born of woman. If all the prophets of old were pointing toward Christ, St John is the one who finally points him out: 'Behold the Lamb of God'.

Prayerful Reflections

St Thomas Aquinas (13th cen.) says of God that though he permits it, evil is not so much a creation, rather it is an absence of good. Here is how the great Dominican theologian Herbert McCabe tries to put it under whose feet I was privileged to sit as a student:

The hole in my sock is simply the absence of wool, but it is just as real as the stone in my shoe. It would be absurd to say that holes in socks are unreal and illusory just because the hole is not made of anything. Nothing in the wrong place can be just as real and just as important as something in the wrong place. If you inadvertently drive your car over a cliff, you will have nothing to worry about; and it is precisely the nothing that you will have to worry about. (Herbert McCabe OP)
