Readings: Kings 4:8-11, 14-16, Romans 6:3-4, 8-11, Matthew 10:37-42.

Hospitality links the first reading to today's Gospel: in the hospitality shown to the prophet Elisha by the woman who offers not just food and drink to sustain him on his frequent journeys that way, but even has a room prepared in which he can rest; and in the gospel, Jesus tells the twelve that anyone who welcomes a prophet because he is a prophet will have a prophet's reward and anyone who offers so much as a cup of cold water to one of these little ones because he is a disciple, will not lose his reward.

Is this just a lesson on the importance of hospitality?

The answer lies in what Jesus says a little earlier on: Anyone who welcomes you welcomes me; and anyone who welcomes me welcomes the one who sent me.

In one of the readings for the school Mass of SS Peter and Paul last week, we heard the risen Jesus calling out to St Paul: (who was on his way to Damascus to persecute more Christians) Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?

In other words: why are you persecuting those who carry my word, my followers...those in whose hearts I live. Before the time of Christ, it was the prophet who carried the word of God and so anyone who welcomed them, received, so to speak, a share in the reward that that prophet would receive from God; hence they received a prophet's reward.

But shouldn't *welcome and hospitality* be offered to anyone in need even if they are not a prophet, a holy person or a follower of Christ?

It is important to remember that in days past, there were no roadside cafés, shops, garages or places to stay as there are today. So, people, especially strangers had to rely entirely on the goodwill of the people whom they encountered – when a cup of cold water could mean the difference between life and death in what could be such a dry and arid climate. Moreover, hospitality to the stranger was always a reminder that they, the people of Israel, were themselves once strangers: It is He, the Lord your God, who sees justice done for the orphan and the

widow and who loves the stranger; giving him food and clothing. Therefore, love the stranger then, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt... (Dt 10: 18-19)

Moreover, in the letter to the Hebrews, the writer tells them not to neglect to show hospitality to the stranger *for thereby some have unknowingly entertained angels*. (13:2) They might have had in mind the story from Genesis where long before the *Exodus*, Abraham and his wife Sarah unknowingly entertained angels. (Gen. Chap 18 & 19)

But in all these cases of hospitality offered to the stranger, especially the stranger doing the work of God, there is a reward: Abraham and his wife who was barren, were given the child of their dreams, as was the woman who provided for Elisha.

And those who welcome Christ's servants, especially if they welcome his word and make a home for it in their hearts, are offering welcome and hospitality to Christ himself who **is** the word. The reward, surely: blessings in this life and eternal life in the next.

RISING COSTS

For everyone, the cost of living is presently rising at an alarming rate. Energy costs are at an all-time high, and the cost of essentials at the supermarket increases each week. So now is not a good time to appeal for additional help for the church's finances, but sadly, however, it is necessary. The heating bills for the church are rising just as much as in your homes, and the maintenance of the old buildings are a constant drain on the church's income.

So, we are asking that if you can do so without making your personal situation much worse, could you consider adding a little extra in your weekly offering or monthly standing order? Just a 10% increase will help offset the much greater costs of electricity, gas and essential maintenance the church faces in the coming months. If you are setting up or amending a standing order, the account details are: **Account name**: *Archdiocese L'Pool Brindle St Joseph's Presb 007*, **Account number**: 71544691, **Sort code**: 40-29-12, **Account type**: *Business*.

Also, if you pay UK income tax, signing up for Gift Aid will cost you nothing, but allow the church to reclaim from the government an additional 20% of your offering.

Another extremely valuable benefit for the church, but one which is often not considered is that of leaving a legacy to the benefit of St Joseph's. If you are considering writing or making amendments to your will, this would be a perfect time to add a clause defining the amount you would like to give to the church. It is very important that any alterations to a will are officially sanctioned to avoid any issues at the time of probate. Thank you.
