Gospel Reading: Matthew 18:15-20

Jesus teaches his disciples how to settle disputes in the Church

Today's Gospel reading is taken from a chapter of Matthew's Gospel, which is sometimes called the "discourse on the Church" or the "church order" discourse. In this part of Matthew's Gospel, Jesus speaks more directly about matters of Church discipline and order. In today's reading we find one of only three instances in which Jesus uses the word church in Matthew's Gospel. In Matthew's record of Jesus' teaching, we can hear echoes of the kinds of issues faced by the early Christian community.

In the first part of the "discourse on the Church" (Matthew 18:1-14), Matthew addresses the Christian community's concerns about rank. Jesus responds to the disciples' question about who is greatest in the kingdom of heaven. Jesus indicates that those who wish to enter the kingdom of heaven must be like children, and he cautions those leaders who might lead these "little ones" astray. He also responds with the parable of the lost sheep, indicating how God will seek out and bring back those "little ones" who have strayed.

In today's Gospel reading, Matthew 18:15-20, Jesus addresses a common occurrence in the Christian community: a dispute between two members of the Church. Jesus outlines a procedure for settling such matters fairly. The victim should privately address the offender and attempt to resolve the dispute without outside involvement. If that fails, then the victim should bring two or three witnesses and confront the offender again. If the dispute is still unresolved, the matter should be brought to the attention of the entire community. If the offender refuses to adhere to the reparations prescribed by the community, then Jesus suggests that the offender may be expelled from the Church.

Jesus does not discourage disagreement within the community of the Church; he acknowledges the reality of conflict and error and offers his disciples a means for addressing such matters. It is in the conclusion to this

teaching that the message of hope is found: Jesus is present with the community and will guide the community in its relations. If decisions are taken in prayer, then the community can be assured of God's assistance.

This week's commemorations

St John Chrysostom (347-407) – "Chrysostom" means "Golden mouth" – a renowned preacher and orator. In 398, as Archbishop of Constantinople, he reformed the corrupt morals of court, clergy and people.

The Exaltation of the Holy Cross recalls three events: the finding of the True Cross by Saint Helena, the dedication of churches built by Emperor Constantine on the site of the Holy Sepulchre and Mount Calvary and the restoration of the True Cross to Jerusalem in AD 629 by the Byzantine emperor Heraclius, after it had fallen into the hands of the Persian Emperor Chosroes II in the AD 614 Sasanian conquest of Jerusalem.

Our Lady of Sorrows commemorates the seven great sorrows which Mary lived in relation to Her Son, as they are recorded in the Gospels or through tradition.

Ss Cornelius and Cyprian. Cornelius became Pope in 251 but died in exile in 253. Cyprian was Bishop of Carthage and was executed by the Roman emperor Valerian.

CAFOD's campaign to improve the World's food system - we can help....

The world is facing a food crisis. Climate change, Covid-19 and the war in Ukraine mean that millions of people don't have enough food. We are also feeling the impact of this at home.

CAFOD works with small farmers around the world who produce lots of the world's food. But many of them are facing a huge problem. For hundreds of years they have freely used and shared their own seeds, but laws are being passed that limit what they are allowed to do with their own seeds, giving them little choice but to buy more expensive seeds from large companies. These laws make it even harder for small farmers and their families to produce enough food.

Salina is a small farmer from Bangladesh and she told CAFOD: "To keep the seeds in our own hands is the main thing. Without seeds, being a farmer is not possible." Small farmers like Salina are doing important work protecting God 's creation and ensuring that seeds are used to feed us all. In Genesis, God says, "See, I have given you every plant yielding seed that is upon the earth, and every tree with seed as its fruit; you shall have them for food." This is why Salina is writing a letter to the World Bank, which has a lot of influence over agricultural issues, asking them to protect the rights of small farmers to use and share their own seeds.

Please sign Salina's letter on the way out of Mass. By signing your name alongside Salina, we can send a strong message to the World Bank that the Catholic community stands with small-scale farmers.

The letter is at the back of church this week and will be sent to CAFOD this Monday, 11th September.
