**Readings: Isaiah 61:1-2,10-11, Thessalonians 5:16-24, John 1:6-8,19-20.**

*The soul cannot enter into the treasures of the Wisdom of God unless it first crosses and enters into the thickets of suffering... it is in such a way that the soul finds there its consolation and desire. (St John of the Cross)*

*Let us love him enough to suffer for him whatever he chooses; even griefs of soul and aridities, anguish... ah! that is indeed a great love... **to love Jesus without feeling the sweetness of that love... martyrdom.** (St Terese of Lisieux)*

With such a view of suffering, were such Saints ever able to enter into the spirit of Gaudete Sunday which takes its name from our introit/entrance antiphon *Rejoice in the Lord always; again, I say, rejoice...* (Phil 4: 4-5)

Could they with joyful hearts enter into the spirit of our psalm with its refrain *My soul rejoices in the Lord?*

With their souls centred upon suffering, could they *be happy in the Lord at all times* as St Paul exhorts the Thessalonians?

How happy and joyful was John the Baptist living in the wilderness, berating the onlookers in his camelhair shirt and living off locusts and wild honey... how often he must have been stung by those bees?

From the witness of these Saints, it is clear that happiness and joy are not to be found in comfort, riches and wealth... one may feel replete and contented, with moments of "happiness" but only very fleeting, and all at the cost of those cares and worries not to lose it all.

But what of the poor, the oppressed and abused, the innocent victims of war... can they be *happy and rejoice* in the Lord at all times let alone give thanks?

It sounds a rather grand and pious thing to say but whether rich or poor, oppressed or free, no one can be truly happy, that is, in the centre of their being, unless the One towards whom St John the Baptist points, speaks of and gives witness to – Jesus Christ – occupies that centre... your centre and my centre, for nothing that is *passing* can ever make us truly happy, only the One who is eternal can do that.

Which is why, elsewhere, St Paul is able to say: *For I am quite certain of this, that neither death nor life, no angel, no prince, nothing that exists and nothing still to come, no power, no height or depth, nor any created thing, can ever come between us and the love of God made visible in Christ Jesus our Lord.* (Rm 8: 38-39.)

So, in this last week of Advent, as we continue to *clear a way for the Lord*, let us find time to pray. But if we find it hard to find time to pray formally, then pray informally, for how could our Lord resist a spontaneous heart-felt prayer.

Or, as St Augustine would advise: just be aware of his presence and have a *desire* for him as we go about our day, but, as we were reminded by St Teresa, it is not so much a *feeling, which could so easily be a delusion*, but the **knowing** he is near, because that is what he has told us.

Most importantly, let us try to be always happy in the Lord and to give thanks, *for that is what God expects us to do in Christ Jesus.*

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## Reflections
