Readings: Jonah 3: 1-5. 10. 1 Corinthians 7: 20-31. Mark 1: 14-20.

Last week we heard about the *calling* by God of the boy Samuel who gave himself to the service of God for the rest of his life and we heard about the *calling* of Peter and his brother Andrew according to St John's Gospel.

This week, we have a different account of the *calling* of Peter and Andrew, also James and his brother John according to St Mark's Gospel.

But Jesus also had a message from God: *The time has come and the kingdom of God is close at hand. Repent and believe the Good News.*

Repent means to change one's mind... even to change direction - from sin and death to right living and life in God - eternal life in God.

Jonah the prophet of our first reading, is an example of how, even in the knowledge of the God who calls, we can still turn away from him... indeed, Jonah flees in the opposite direction to Nineveh, the place to which he had been sent.

The link with the Gospel is the call to repentance, for Jonah had been called by God to warn the Ninevites that unless they turn from their evil ways, God will destroy them.

It is while he is in the belly of the great fish, that Jonah contemplates his own *calling* and after being regurgitated onto dry land, God gives Jonah a second chance to carry out his mission, which he does.

The story of Jonah tells us something of God's patience: he did not give up on Jonah but created circumstances... albeit it bizarre circumstances... and gave Jonah the time in which he could *change his mind* - he will surely do that for you and me too.

But, as we reflected last week, we may say: I **am** responding to God's calling otherwise I wouldn't be here now - which is true - but what might we yet, be holding back on?

Because there is another aspect of this story which, though not specifically relevant to this week's theme of the call to repentance, is no less a *calling* - and that is to mercy and

the forgiveness of others.

For after hearing God's call to repentance through his prophet Jonah, the people of Ninevah did repent and, in his mercy, God spared them.

This frustrates and angers Jonah because he believed they deserved to be wiped off the face of the earth for their sins against God.

You have to read the whole story to see how God, in his continued mercy, gently teaches Jonah the error of his ways.

May he as gently teach us the error of **our** ways as he calls us to repent and believe the Good News.

Commemorations this week

St Francis de Sales, Bishop of Geneva and Doctor of the Church (1567-1622). As a priest, much of his time was given to winning people back from Calvinism which he achieved through effective preaching and being driven more by love than anything else, but Calvinism always posed a threat to his life. As Bishop he was devoted to the reorganization of his diocese but especially to the caring of souls through his preaching and spiritual guidance. He taught that whoever wants to preach effectively must preach with love and that all can live a devout and spiritual life, for holiness is not reserved just for monks and hermits. He was held in such high respect that a Calvinist minister said "if we honoured anyone as a saint, I know of no-one since the days of the Apostles more worthy than this man".

The Conversion of Saint Paul celebrates his conversion from persecuting the Christians to becoming (with Peter) their foremost leader. 'Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?' From these words of Christ to Saul, we learn that what we do to each other we do to Christ for good or ill.

Ss Timothy and Titus were converted to Christianity by St Paul and became his companions. Two of Paul's Pastoral Letters are addressed to each of them.

RISING COSTS

For everyone, the cost of living is presently rising at an alarming rate. Energy costs are at an all-time high, and the cost of essentials at the supermarket increases each week. So now is not a good time to appeal for additional help for the church's finances, but sadly, however, it is necessary. The heating bills for the church are rising just as much as in your homes, and the maintenance of the old buildings are a constant drain on the church's income.

So, we are asking that if you can do so without making your personal situation much worse, could you consider adding a little extra in your weekly offering or monthly standing order? Just a 10% increase will help offset the much greater costs of electricity, gas and essential maintenance the church faces in the coming months.

Also, if you pay UK income tax, signing up for Gift Aid will cost you nothing, but allow the church to reclaim from the government an additional 20% of your offering.

Another extremely valuable benefit for the church, but one which is often not considered, is that of leaving a legacy to the benefit of St Joseph's. If you are considering writing or making amendments to your will, this would be a perfect time to add a clause defining the amount you would like to give to the church. It is very important that any alterations to a will are officially sanctioned to avoid any issues at the time of probate. Thank you.
