Readings: Job 7:1-4,6-7, 1 Corinthians 9:16-19,22-23, Mark 1:29-39.

The character, Job, of our first reading, is described as a sound, honest, God-fearing man who shunned evil.

He was a man of wealth, family and good standing, all of which were seen as blessings from God for a life well lived.

And then suddenly his good fortune is reversed and he loses everything and is left sitting, riddled with sores, in sackcloth and ashes and we remember his famous lament *Naked I came from my mother's womb, naked I shall return.* (ie to the womb of mother earth) *The Lord gave, the Lord has taken back. Blessed be the name of the Lord.*

He curses his fallen state but he never curses God and he is further tormented by three 'comforters' who basically tell him to grin and bear it because he must have sinned... though Job is convinced that he hasn't.

The story resolves in Job having to learn that a righteous life can make no claim upon God's favours – reminding us of Jesus saying that the rain falls and the sun shines on the good and bad alike. Job's fortunes are restored to him but no clear answer is given to the mystery of suffering; only that God's ways are beyond the comprehension of man.

The mystery of suffering presents itself in today's Gospel, but Jesus, instead of wasting time questioning it, sets about doing something about it; not by separating the good from the bad, but healing all who came to him – the separation, he will later say, will come in the *Final Judgement.* (Mt 25: 31ff)

But for us now, in humility with Job, we learn to admit of our limited understanding about the mysteries of suffering, itself part of the mystery that is God, and to trust that there is a bigger picture beyond the limitations of our tiny minds.

However, unlike Job, we do have an answer to the mystery of suffering, maybe not the answer we would like because it is a better answer than anything we could have imagined.

For the answer can only be found in the one who says:

Come to me all who labour and are overburdened and I will give you rest: (Mt 11: 28)

Jesus Christ.

This week's Saints

St Agatha (3rd c.) of Sicily was a young girl who vowed her virginity to Christ bringing upon herself the most violent cruelties from the pagan authorities. She was forced into a brothel and tortured by rods, rack and fire and was horribly mutilated before she died of her injuries in prison.

In his homily about her, St Methodius, bishop of Sicily, tells us that her name means 'good' and that 'her goodness coincides with her name and way of life. She won a good name by her noble deeds and by her name she points to the nobility of those deeds. Agatha, her mere name wins all men over to her company. She teaches them by her example to hasten with her to the true Good, God alone'.

St Paul Miki and companions St Paul was a 16th c. Japanese Jesuit who preached the Gospel to the Japanese people with great success. But during a persecution of Catholics, he and his companions were arrested, tortured and bound to crosses upon which they were speared.

St Scholastica (480 – 543-7) Sister of St Benedict and first Benedictine nun, her convent being about five miles from Monte Cassino where her brother was Abbot. A story goes that every year they would meet in a house not far from his monastery and talk of the things of God. On one visit, just before he was to leave, she urged him to stay but he refused. So, she prayed silently and a violent storm broke out. Shocked, Benedict said to his sister 'May God forgive you sister, what have you done?' and had to remain there, where they happily continued their discourse. Three days later, from his cell, Benedict saw the soul of his sister rising to heaven like a dove and he buried her in a tomb he had prepared for himself. Their minds had always been united in God; their bodies were to share a common grave.

RISING COSTS

For everyone, the cost of living is presently rising at an alarming rate. Energy costs are at an all-time high, and the cost of essentials at the supermarket increases each week. So now is not a good time to appeal for additional help for the church's finances, but sadly, however, it is necessary. The heating bills for the church are rising just as much as in your homes, and the maintenance of the old buildings are a constant drain on the church's income.

So, we are asking that if you can do so without making your personal situation much worse, could you consider adding a little extra in your weekly offering or monthly standing order? Just a 10% increase will help offset the much greater costs of electricity, gas and essential maintenance the church faces in the coming months.

Also, if you pay UK income tax, signing up for Gift Aid will cost you nothing, but allow the church to reclaim from the government an additional 20% of your offering.

Another extremely valuable benefit for the church, but one which is often not considered, is that of leaving a legacy to the benefit of St Joseph's. If you are considering writing or making amendments to your will, this would be a perfect time to add a clause defining the amount you would like to give to the church. It is very important that any alterations to a will are officially sanctioned to avoid any issues at the time of probate. Thank you.
