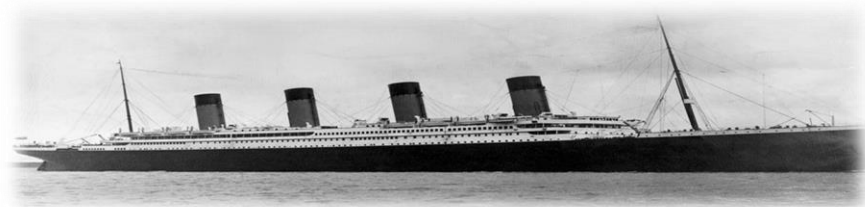

- At the time of its launch, the Titanic was the largest movable man-made object in the entire world.
- The Titanic was one of the first ships to have a telephone system and electric lights in all the rooms.
- The ship was as tall as a 17-story building.
- It is estimated that the total wealth of the passengers in the Titanic's first class was £400 million.

<b>iceberg</b> - a large floating mass of ice detached from a glacier or ice sheet and carried out to sea.	<b>construction</b> - the action of building something, typically a large structure.	<b>vessel</b> - a ship or large boat.
<b>survivors</b> - a person who survives, especially a person remaining alive after an event in which others have died.	<b>captain</b> - the person in command of a ship.	<b>unsinkable</b> - (of a ship or boat) unable to be sunk.
<b>route</b> - a way or course taken in getting from a starting point to a destination.	<b>crew</b> - a group of people who work on and operate a ship, aircraft, etc.	<b>preserved</b> - maintain (something) in its original or existing state.
