Why was the sinking of the Titanic such a famous event and how have things changed since this disaster?



- At the time of its launch, the Titanic was the largest movable man-made object in the entire world.
- The Titanic was one of the first ships to have a telephone system and electric lights in all the rooms.
- The ship was as tall as a 17-story building.
- It is estimated that the total wealth of the passengers in the Titanic's first class was £400 million.

iceberg - a large floating mass of ice detached from a glacier or ice sheet and carried out to sea.	construction - the action of building something, typically a large structure.	vessel - a ship or large boat.
survivors - a person who survives, especially a person remaining alive after an event in which others have died.	captain - the person in command of a ship.	unsinkable - (of a ship or boat) unable to be sunk.
route - a way or course taken in getting from a starting point to a destination.	crew - a group of people who work on and operate a ship, aircraft, etc.	preserved - maintain (something) in its original or existing state.
