Readings: Genesis 22:1-2,9-13,15-18, Romans 8:31-34, Mark 9:2-10.

The story of the sacrifice of his son Isaac by Abraham in our first reading has mixed reviews.

It has been described as one of the most brilliantly told narratives in the book of Genesis, but the question is also asked: why should we ascribe to God the kind of behaviour we would find repulsive among humanity – namely, the idea of God, after having finally granted Abraham and Sarah, in their old age, the son they had for so long prayed, then to command Abraham to sacrifice him as a test of faith.

In the event, God, in the last second 'stays' the hand of Abraham as he is about to slay him, since he had never intended to allow Abraham to go through with it, though of course, Abraham wasn't to know that.

Some see the event as a sign of the prohibition of child sacrifices still practised by neighbouring nations. (Lv 18:21 & Dt 18:10) Others see Isaac's carrying of the wood up the mountain – the intended sacrifice and his being the victim – as a 'type' of Christ who, as priest and victim, will carry the wood of the cross up another hill upon which he will be sacrificed; while yet others say that the story conveys no adequate meaning other than that it is, as the text says, a test of Abraham's faith.

While we thank God that he doesn't call upon **us** to demonstrate such tests of faith, nevertheless, our faith in a loving God is challenged with every report of the horrors that humanity inflicts upon its own members, especially when done in the name of God, to say nothing of the natural disasters and damage to the environment that bring so much suffering and death to the innocent.

But Abraham's was a faith that believed that God could somehow bring life out of death... that if somehow, through this horror, he could keep his faith, then all will be well, and all was indeed well for Abraham and for us his descendants and beneficiaries of the promises and blessings he received from God as a reward for his faithful obedience.

Nevertheless, in this and other OT stories, we may still see God as a demanding tyrant who wants nothing but total obedience from his subjects. But, as we reflected last week, we have always to put Jesus into the centre of the equation.

And when we do so, we find a God, yes, jealous for our love if that means he cannot bear the thought of losing us to anything less or other than himself. But a better term would be: a God who is *passionate* for our love and who loves us with a passion far greater than anything we could return to him or give to another.

It is with this faith in God's passionate love for us that we can face the evils and difficulties of this world, confident that he can bring life out of death, good out of bad.

In all our difficulties, as St Paul says in our second reading, we need God on our side to plead on our behalf for mercy and deliverance from the dark forces of evil that so severely test our faith.

So, to the Gospel, where Jesus leads his disciples up the mountain and, in front of them, is transfigured.

His clothes became dazzlingly white, whiter than any earthly bleacher could make them. Elijah and Moses who represent the law and the prophets (essentially the OT) appeared and were talking to Jesus – and a voice speaks from a mysterious cloud: *This is my beloved, listen to him.* 

Why the *Transfiguration?* 

The preface tells us: For after he had told the disciples of his coming death, on the holy mountain he manifested to them his glory, to show even by the testimony of the law and the prophets, that the Passion leads to the glory of the Resurrection.

So then: many years before, on a mountain, a son is to be sacrificed and, many years later, *The Son* is to be sacrificed. On both occasions, the forces of darkness appeared to have prevailed over the good and innocent. But on both occasions, darkness was *transfigured* into the light of salvation: for Abraham and especially Isaac, by the saving voice of the angel and for Jesus, in the glory of his resurrection.

So, this Lent and always, let us listen for the voice, the only voice who can transfigure these wretched bodies into copies of his own glorified body. (Ph. 3: 21)

#### Reflection

It may mean that you have to sign a written agreement form and be provided with a code of conduct and role description. If this is so we will contact you. Thank you for all you do.
