Classroom Round Up: Yet again, we've had another busy week in **Class R/1**! In RE, the children enjoyed creating some Palm Sunday inspired artwork using coloured card and oil pastels. In geography, the children identified which animals live in hot and cold places and worked hard to explain why each animal was suited to each habitat. The children are working equally as hard in English to plan and write a non-chronological report on Arctic and desert animals. To end the week, the children were thrilled to have lunch with their family members on Friday. We look forward to starting our 'Freestanding Structures' unit next week as we begin DT week which is always popular amongst the class.

What a super week in **Class 2/3/4**! In English, we began exploring our new text 'Ottoline and the Yellow Cat", looking at making predictions, using subordinate conjunctions and correctly punctuating speech. In Maths, Year 2 and Year 3 completed tasks on measure and Year 4 challenged themselves with their fractions work. Through the



Year 2 and Year 3 science, the children researched different types of habitats found around the world. Through our RE topic, we compared the similarities between the Last Supper and the Liturgy of the Eucharist, focusing on Jesus' words and actions.

It has been another busy week at St Joseph's in **Class 5/6**! The children all started their new art unit this week focusing on expressing themselves and therefore it was a huge hit! Throughout the unit, they will be studying the work of Luba Lukova and later producing some of their own work inspired by her. In maths, Y5 have been exploring percentages, whilst Y6 have been looking at area and perimeter. Geography wise, the children have been focusing on the importance of field sketches and how they can be a useful source of information when studying a local area. WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

While Bluesky has been around since 2019, it's suddenly taken off in a big way thanks to a significant exodus from X (formerly Twitter). Indeed, it looks and behaves a lot like Twitter before Elon Musk bought the platform. Bluesky has been touted in recent months as a safer, more open-minded alternative to X - but like any social media site, it still has its share of risks.

NO PRIVATE ACCOUNTS

While most social networks allow accounts to be private, at the time of writing, all Bluesky accounts must be public. The development team has indicated this might change in the future, but the app is built one queblic first protocol. If originate first protoco ilt on a pul lf privat accounts are ever introduced, it may only be in a limited way – such as through the implementation of group chats. /2010/05/10 /

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INTERACTIONS WITH STRANGERS

ery account being public means that anyone can be contacted by anyone else. While users don't have to respond and can easily block people and move on, it does m that youngsters are at particular risk of bei not youngsters are at paractar insk of being conned by scammers, messaged by predatory adults or exposed to others with ill intentions. These hazards can be compounded by the fact that Bluesky doesn't require its users to provide their real name.

TROLLING AND BULLYING

Vhile Bluesky currently feels a lot friendlier than (seems to have become, its lack of private locounts means that there's nothing to stop accounts means that there's nothing to stop users from trolling and cyberbullying younger people. While accounts can be blocked and reported, a persistent bully could simply creat a new profile, potentially making their victims feel unsafe in continuing to use the app.

GE RESTRICTION

Bluesky isn't designed with children in mind, and there aren't many parental controls on the platform. In an interview with the BBC, Bluesky's CEO originally said that the app would only allow users aged 18 and above to sign up, but a spokesperson later clarified its age restriction as 134. This could imply the app was originally meant for an adult autience and supperstender meant for an adult audience and suggests that naking the platform more child-ot currently be a priority.

Advice for Parents & Educators

USE THE ADULT CONTENT FILTER

UNDER Bluesky doesn't have much in the way of parental controls, but there are content filters which can hide sexual and graphic imagery. These are enabled by defaul for underage accounts but can be manually turned on in the 'Moderation' section of the and/or the article accounts but can be manually turned on in the 'Moderation' section of the default of the section app's settings. The 'advanced' Bluesky Moderation Service lets you restrict content eve further, hiding – for example – self-harm content, extremist rhetoric, and even rude pos

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ENCOURAGE BLOCKING AND REPORTING

Another tool that Bluesky uses to ensure a decent experience is muting and blocking accounts. The former prevents you from seeing a specific user's sontent, while the latter stops them from seeing yours. If a child is encountering trolls or bullies on the platform, encourage them to use this function, while also reporting the nders to help make the platform a nicer place for everyone

official domains, with users' handles linking to other sites; while this isn't widely used rig v, it could be a reliable way to verify celebrities and public figures in future

As with all social media platforms, moderation and content filters can only do so r it's highly likely that a child will eventually face something unsavoury. For that rea important to make sure that young people are aware of the risks and know how to the technology if anything they see on the app makes them feel unsafe or uncomf
