Acts 7:55,60, Revelation 22:12-14,16-17,20, John 17:20-26.

Why did God make us?

Those of us of a certain age will remember the answer in our childhood *Catechism*: To love and serve him in this world and to be happy with him in the next.

Catholic theology and spirituality also teach that the capacity of a person to enjoy the *beatific vision* will depend upon their capacity to love and serve God in this life.

In our first reading, the martyrdom of St Stephen gives witness to the depths he was willing to go in his love and service when, even before he dies, he is privileged to a vision of the heavens opening and the sight of the *Son of Man standing at the right hand of God.*

But it is Jesus to whom he pleads to receive his spirit and not to hold their sin against them, before he falls asleep.

In our desire to deepen our knowledge of God as we try to live up to that teaching from the *Catechism*, it is tempting to bypass Jesus, as if to cut-through him and go straight to the Father, perhaps awaiting visions, a deeper insight or perhaps a personal word from him.

After all, we may think that if the *Trinity* is one God, then it doesn't matter to which of the three persons we address our prayers – and doesn't Jesus say to Philip: *to have seen me is to have seen the Father.*

Of course, this is all true, after all, the prayer Jesus taught us is addressed to the Father.

But it is Jesus who teaches us the prayer and it is through him that the Father receives it – just as other prayers are addressed to the Father but *through Christ our Lord*.

In St John's Gospel, Jesus says to his disciples: whatever you ask for in my name I will do it, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son ... and I shall ask the Father and he will give you another helper to be with you forever: the Spirit of truth. (Jn 14)

The Catechism tells us that there is no other way of Christian prayer than Christ. Whether our prayer is communal or personal, vocal or interior, it has access to the Father only if we pray in the name of Jesus. The sacred humanity of Jesus is therefore the way by which the Holy Spirit teaches us to pray to God the Father. (CCC 2664)

This could be a reflection for the feast of the Trinity but it is not meant to be.

To repeat: before he died, St Stephen saw the Son of Man (Jesus) standing at the right hand of God. (The Father)

But it was not the Father to whom he addressed his prayer, but Jesus, who reveals himself as the Way the Truth and the Life.

God made us to love and serve him in this world and to be happy with him in the next and this can only be done through Jesus Christ who desires nothing more than for us to be happy with him in heaven, even though he cannot guarantee our happiness on earth.

So, as we intensify our prayers at this unsettling time, let us follow St Stephen's example and call upon the name of Jesus: for the Spirit and the Bride say 'Come' and let the one who is thirsty come: let the one who desires take the water of life without price, for He who testifies to these things says, 'surely I am coming soon'.

So together or alone, night and day, let us call upon his name:

Amen. Come, Lord Jesus ... Maranatha

This week's Saints

St Charles Lwanga and 22 companions (19th cent) were wrapped in reed mats and burnt alive for criticising the Ugandan King Mwanga for debauchery, murder and gross immoral acts. Most were converts from paganism, the youngest being only 13, and some worked as servants in the King's household. Within one year of their deaths, the catechumens in the country quadrupled. Charles Lwanga is the patron of Catholic Action and of Black African Youth since all of those Martyrs were under the age of 25.

St Boniface (675-754) born in Devon, educated in a monastery in Exeter and became a monk of the Benedictine monastery of Nursling near Southampton.

An enthusiastic teacher and preacher, he ended up preaching the Gospel to the heathens in Germany and became Bishop of Mainz. He founded and restored dioceses and helped reform the Frankish church. At over 70 years of age he was set upon and killed while awaiting some neophytes for confirmation. He is honoured as the Apostle of Germany.
