

Readings: Acts 2:1-11, 1 Corinthians 12:3-7,12-13, John 20:19-23.

Only faith can guarantee the blessings that we hope for ... it was for faith that our ancestors were commended. (Heb. 11:1-2)

The Letter to the Hebrews (not in today's Mass) continues with a litany of holy and devout figures of faith in the OT: from Abel to Abraham, David, Samuel and the prophets, concluding with the thought that these were all heroes of faith in promises that they were not to receive in this life since God had made provision for them to reach perfection along with us.

So, for example, Abraham did not live long enough to see the land promised to him and his descendants; and although God showed him it, Moses did not live long enough to enter the promised land towards which he was leading God's people.

Implicit in all this was the gradual realization that the promised land, and the perfections promised, must be beyond this temporal and very imperfect world – hence the *provision for us to have something better;* the better being that all who hope in faith for those promises, will find their faith fulfilled partially in this life but fully in the next.

Our pilgrimage to the fulfilment of those promises in faith is a work in progress under the guiding hand of the Father, through his Son in the grace of the Holy Spirit whose feast we are celebrating today.

It was the Spirit who (though unrecognized as such) led those great biblical figures towards an unknown but hoped for future; the same Spirit who in its fulness, revealed itself to those people in our first reading, uniting

them as one in understanding and who, in today's Gospel, transformed those fearful and trembling disciples, cowering in the upper room, to become courageous, fearless preachers of the *Good News*, willing to go anywhere and to any lengths, even death, to spread it.

As we look around and see so much violence, suffering and death, we may despair of any of God's promises ever being fulfilled.

However, as disciples of Christ and members of his body, we follow in the footsteps of those great figures who went before us with *faith in things as yet unseen but hoped for*.

Thus, all our prayers on this the feast of Pentecost call upon God to send his Spirit to sanctify and renew us, to console and purify us, to heal and comfort us when we die.

But most importantly, in this jubilee year of *Hope*, we pray for the Spirit to keep us ever *faithful* to the promises of God ... as yet *unseen*, but in which we continue to *hope*.

Reflections

To live without faith, without a heritage to defend, without battling constantly for truth, is not to live but to 'get along'. We must never just 'get along.' (Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati)

It is not the actual physical exertion that counts towards one's progress, nor the nature of the task, but by the spirit of faith with which it is undertaken. (St Francis Xavier)

Though it seemed Abraham's hope could not be fulfilled, he hoped and he believed ... and became the Father of many nations as he had been promised. (Rm 4:18)

And so, we have no eyes for things that are visible, but only for things that are invisible; for while visible things last only for a time, invisible things are eternal. (2 Cor. 4:18)

This week's commemorations

Mary, Mother of the Church is a celebration only added to the universal calendar in 2018 which helps us to remember that: '...growth in the Christian life must be anchored to the Mystery of the Cross; to the oblation of Christ in the Eucharistic Banquet and to the Mother of the Redeemer and of the Redeemed for she is the Virgin who makes her offering to God.' (From the Decree)

St Barnabas (whose name means Son of Encouragement or Consolation) was a Jewish Cypriot who introduced the new convert St Paul to the Apostles and accompanied him on his first missionary journey before they separated over what is described as a violent quarrel. (Acts 15: 38) It is encouraging or even consoling to know that even the greatest of saints can quarrel and fall out.

Our Lord Jesus Christ, Eternal High Priest reminds us of His Priestly mediation between God and man, heaven and earth and our participation in His ministry.

St Anthony of Padua (1195-1231) Began as an Augustinian but later became a Franciscan and after ordination was commended for his learning, eloquent preaching and winning countenance.

At some point, a novice tired of the Franciscan life made off with Anthony's Psalter book which contained his teaching notes and comments and which was valuable to him. Anthony prayed for its return and the novice stopped in his tracks, returned the book and resumed his novitiate hence the tradition of praying to him for lost items. (Another tradition says that a novice simply took the Psalter without permission.)

St Anthony's Bread recalls his compassion for the poor and he died at the early age of 36 and is a Doctor of the Church.

May the hearts of all of us gathered here in faith and hope be open to the gifts and fruits of the Spirit as we unite our prayers with those of Mary: Hail Mary ...

Now, for a moment of silent prayer.

Priest: Father, you sent the Holy Spirit among us to empower us to proclaim your goodness to the world. May he dwell in our hearts as we journey in faith towards the fulfilment of things as yet unseen but in which we dare to hope, through Christ our Lord.

Priest: As we thank God for the gift of his Son in Holy Communion, let us remember those of our Parish who are sick or housebound.
