Nut Allery Reminder: Can we just remind you that as one of our children has recently been diagnosed with a severe nut allergy, school is now a "<u>nut-free"</u> zone. This means that pupils cannot bring in snacks or packed lunch items that contain nuts of any sort. This includes items such as chocolate/nut spread eg Nutella or similar brands, as well Snickers-style or fruit & nut chocolate bars and Kinder Bueno for example. Staff are checking snacks and packed lunches to make sure this is being adhered to.
