Last weekend attendance: 106, collection: £265.70 – thank you! Thank you also for August's standing orders which averaged £126.90 per week.

Readings: Habakkuk 1:2-3, 2:2:2-4, 2 Timothy 1:6-8,13-14, Luke 17:5-10.

O Lord, how long shall I cry for help and you will not hear? Or cry to you 'violence' and you will not save?

We do not have to go back 600 years before Christ to Habakkuk's time, or to Hitler's death camps, to know that this cry for help must have been on the lips of so many not lucky enough to see this prayer of the prophet answered.

We see such cries for help in the faces of so many today suffering oppression of one kind or another and it has been with us and will be with us probably until the end of time.

The cry reminds us of that *God-fearing and upright man*, Job, after having lost all he loved and owned.

Perplexed as to why this should have happened, he finds himself asking: who can question God, even if one is right, about the injustices of this world, since God alone is the final judge and arbiter.

However, a little later, Habakkuk is inspired to say that it is not the will of the Lord Sabbaoth, that the labouring of the people should end in fire, and the toiling of the nations come to nothing: for the country shall be filled with the knowledge of the glory of the Lord and as we heard today: the righteous shall live by faith.

In two of his letters, St Paul speaks of the righteous man who find life through faith (Gal.3:12 & Rom.1:17) and the eleventh chapter of Hebrews has a eulogy in praise of faith.

Moving to today's Gospel, we find the apostles asking Jesus to increase their faith. He replies: *if you had faith like a grain of mustard seed, you could say to this mulberry tree, "Be uprooted and planted in the sea,"* and it would obey you.'

This is the gift that St Paul refers to in our second reading: the gift of faith that needs to be fanned into a flame with the spirit of power, love and self-control.

Faith, and the graces and wonders that flow from it, are all gifts entrusted to his followers, and so Jesus reminds them that they should not be seeking thanks and praise for carrying out his will with these gifts, any more than a servant entrusted to carry his own masters' will.

So they should not to be looking for praise or reward, but to remember that We are merely servants who have done no more than our duty.

And yes, we may and do cry to God in our frustration, pain and even anger, but God's holy people have been doing that long before us and will continue to do so long after us.

If we continue to cry out in faith, our prayer will surely not go unheard. The key is not to allow our hearts to harden.

Reflection

Men will lose all the material things they leave behind in this world, but they will carry with them the reward of their charity and the alms they gave. For this, they will receive from the Lord the reward and the recompense they deserve. (St Francis of Assisi)

This week's commemorations

Our Lady of the Rosary reminds us that October is set aside for this particular devotion. An opportunity for parents to teach their children how to pray the rosary and perhaps feel the power of her motherly intercession for our deepest needs.

St John Henry Newman was born on 21st February 1801 in London. As an Anglican clergyman for over twenty years he won renown as a preacher and theologian. A Fellow of Oriel College, Oxford, he became one of the leaders of the Oxford Movement and a prominent figure in the Church of England. On 9th October 1845 he was received into full communion with the Catholic Church by Blessed Dominic Barberi of the Passionist Congregation. After a period of study in Rome he was ordained priest on 30th May 1847. Returning to England he established the Oratory of Saint Philip Neri in Birmingham. He was an influential writer on many subjects, most notably the development of Christian doctrine, the true understanding of conscience, faith and reason, the role of the laity, and university education. In 1879 he was created Cardinal by Pope Leo XIII and given the title of San Giorgio in Velabro. He died in the Birmingham Oratory on 11th August 1890. He was beatified by Pope Benedict XVI on 19th September 2010 and canonised by Pope Francis on 13th October 2019.
